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MANDATE

The New Brunswick Arts Board is an arm's-length arts funding agency with a legislated mandate to:

Facilitate and promote the creation of art;

Facilitate the enjoyment, awareness and understanding of the arts;

Advise the government on arts policy;

Unify and speak for the arts community; and

Administer funding programs for professional artists.

The New Brunswick Arts Board (NBAB) was established in 1989 as part of the New Brunswick government's fine arts policy: *The New Brunswick Arts Board Act* was assented to on November 9, 1990, and came into force on June 13, 1991. This act was amended in 1999 (*An Act to Amend the New Brunswick Arts Board Act*) in order to extend the autonomy and areas of responsibilities of the New Brunswick Arts Board.

The New Brunswick Arts Board is composed of twelve members, balancing gender, the five regions of the province, the various linguistic and aboriginal communities, and the various artistic disciplines.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



BENOÎT DUGUAY

In accordance with the law that created the New Brunswick Arts Board — Conseil des arts du Nouveau-Brunswick, (hereafter called **artsnb**) "The fiscal year of the Board ends on the thirty-first day of March of each year." So, the present annual Chairperson's report includes the period from April the 1, 2007 to March 31, 2008.

Since I replaced the previous Chairperson, Mark Blagrave, in September 2008, this report covers two mandates. Please allow me to mention Mark's participation in the *États généraux sur les arts et la culture dans la société acadienne*, which were held in Caraquet on May, 2007, on behalf of **artsnb**, something very much appreciated. I sincerely thank and congratulate him on the wonderful work he did as Chairperson of **artsnb**.

I also wish to extend sincere thanks and congratulations to the Director, Pauline Bourque, whose innovative ideas have contributed to the improvement of **artsnb** and the best interests of our province's professional artists.

If we could describe this year in just a few words, we would say that it was a very exciting and motivating year with great partnership projects. There were changes in our programs, public action, and **artsnb**'s governance policy.

To the best of its ability, **artsnb** prioritized professional artists with interesting scholarship programs and Excellence Awards. The Board has concluded a very productive year with three partnership projects: one with the city of Saint John; one with the city of Edmundston; and one with the Aboriginal Communities, in order to foster greater involvement in New Brunswick's arts community.

artsnb has maintained an active participation in the Canadian Public Arts Funders (CPAF). Both past and present Chairpersons have attended the national meetings of this new organisation on behalf of the Board. Since CPAF is an excellent source of information for us, we will certainly attend its next annual meeting, which will be held in Moncton in November.

The year 2007-2008 will be remembered for the application of the Governance Manual. The principles which had been adopted by the Board for its governance were inspired by the belief that "membership on the board is a position of public trust." I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank all members of the Board for their strong, bold commitment to the **artsnb** mandate.

The 2008-2009 fiscal year had a "first" for **artsnb**: the presentation of a document by the Chairperson and the Director at the public provincial hearings, which were conducted by the Minister of Finance, the Honourable Victor Boudreau. Entitled "Arts and Culture and Their Impact on Self-Sufficiency" (Riverview, January 28, 2008), this document highlighted for the consideration of the Minister, with supporting figures, the impact of arts and culture upon the social and economic self-sufficiency of the province of New Brunswick. Statistics Canada has indicated that for every dollar invested in the arts, the return on investment is seven times. In New Brunswick this represents more than 8,000 jobs.

A similar presentation was made to the Minister of Wellness, Culture and Sport, the Honourable Hédard Albert. In a joint meeting with l'Association acadienne des artistes professionnel.le.s du N.-B., we presented a document entitled *The Financing of Arts and Culture in New Brunswick*. Among other ideas (also supporting figures), we quoted the result of a study done by Heritage Canada, which states that: "creative enterprises and the cultural sector in general, are key growth engines of the new economy."

In that spirit, the Director and I invited some colleagues from professional artists associations to join us in attending the Premier's State of the Province's Address, on January 31, 2008, in Fredericton. The Honourable Premier had forgotten to include artists in his list of people acting as engines for the economic and social development of the province. Many of those attending the banquet, us included, sent an e-mail to the Premier to tell him that we were very disappointed by this omission.

Unfortunately, none of our recommendations were included in the budget submitted to the Legislature by the Minister of Finance the following month. There was a small two million increase in the budget of the Department of Wellness, Culture and Sport, but no increase for **artsnb**. We informed the Finance Minister of our disappointment, as well as his colleague, the Honourable Hédard Albert, the day after the presentation of the provincial budget. Let us now hope that our messages will obtain better results in the next provincial budget.

Our relations with the Department of Wellness, Culture and Sport are important to us. I have met many times the Deputy Minister, Sylvie Lévesque Finn, to share our concerns. Each time, I received a warm and encouraging welcome. I am grateful to her and will always be delighted to meet her again, to remind her how we wish to make **artsnb** a productive organization for the professional arts in New Brunswick.

The development of **artsnb** does not stop in this fiscal year. Other partnership projects are being discussed with other municipalities, and with arts communities in Quebec, Manitoba, Ireland, and the State of Maine. Professional artists will be the first beneficiaries of these initiatives.

artsnb must continue in the spirit of the law adopted by the Legislature in 1990, which reads: "The purposes of the Board are to facilitate and promote the creation and production of art and the enjoyment, awareness and understanding of the arts in New Brunswick."

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



PAULINE BOURQUE, BSc, LLB

As mentioned in our Chair's word, fiscal year 2007-2008 has been quite hectic. We're still catching our breath. The year has been marked by new partnerships. We've set up a Circle of Elders to ensure better representation of aboriginal cultures and we've hired two aboriginal consultants, one for Mi'kmaq nations and one for Maliseet nations. We have a special partnership with the province of Québec, one with the City of Saint John and one with the City of Edmundston. Our quest continues for more partnerships. We're presently preparing agreements with Northern Ireland and Manitoba, and are presently negotiating partnerships with the City of Fredericton, the City of Moncton, and the Town of Caraquet. We are also setting up a network of all the arts councils in Atlantic Canada. These partnerships stretch public dollars, ensuring that our artists can circulate and create outside the province while remaining residents of New Brunswick, and allowing artists from other provinces to come create in our province.

I wish to sincerely thank the board members for their tremendous support. I particularly thank my dear colleagues, without whom our accomplishments would not be so successful.

Before we review this year's activities, I would like to share two definitions which are most subject to query at NBAB: What is the definition of a professional artist, and what is the role of the Arts Board?

Primarily, both are at the service of art.

Professional artists are people who have devoted their entire lives to artistic creation. They are on a perpetual quest and work on their art regardless of everything else. They transgress; they go against all known codes. They can become lost in a grain of sand, study it to its depths, appropriate it, reinterpret it, and transfigure it so as to situate it in their contemporary universe. They are never satisfied. Although they need it, money is not their motivation — rather, it is the quest in that grain of sand that moves them. The life energy they confer to their artwork will live on and still be present in the future, and is the reason we will still speak of them 300 years from now.

The New Brunswick Arts Board, a crown agency, invests its funds in this quest because in 300 years, when these artists are discussed, it will be a discussion about our society. Because of these artists, we can ensure that future generations have an art heritage that is deep, rich, and reflective of how our way of life has evolved.



ACTIVITIES OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK ARTS BOARD 2007-2008

NOMINATIONS

During the year, the composition of the Arts Board changed somewhat. Ludmilla Knezkova-Hussey finished her mandate and Chris Lloyd moved to Montreal. We are sincerely grateful for the work they accomplished during their mandates, and wish them great success in their new ventures. At the September 2007 Annual General Meeting, no new board members were introduced.

The Nominations Committee, consisting of Benoît Duguay, Andrea Scott, and David Umholtz, could not propose nominees to the Board because the candidates proposed did not have the required profile. New members are expected in the new fiscal year.

In September 2007, a new executive was elected. Benoît Duguay became Chair; Andrea Scott, 1st Vice Chair, Louise Blanchard, 2nd Vice Chair, and Odette Snow, Secretary Treasurer.

EXECUTIVE

The Arts Board held three business meetings and an Annual General meeting during the year. Two meetings were held, one in Fredericton in May, one in Moncton in September 2007 (along with the Annual General Meeting), and one in Fredericton in February 2008.

BOARD ACTIVITIES The Executive Committee met twice during the year. The Executive Director and the Chair participated in the national meeting for professional arts funders, which was held in Ottawa in November. The Executive Director sat on the steering committee of the Canadian Public Arts Funders (CPAF) and attended other meetings. Her mandate is completed, but was extended for an additional year, since the next annual meeting will be held in Moncton in November 2008. The Executive Director has been planning this event with the CPAF secretariat.

The Chair and the Executive Director made a presentation to the new Minister of Culture, Hon. Hédard Albert. They were accompanied by the chair and a representative of l'AAAPNB. The Chair also made a presentation to the Minister of Finance.

The Executive Director has continued her participation in the follow-up work of two standing committees des *États généraux sur les arts et la culture en Acadie*. She has met with committees from both Saint John and Edmundston to launch the pilot regional projects.

FINANCEThe board's fiscal year ended with a deficit of (\$10,425). The NBAB had decided to
incur a deficit of \$23,000 in order to reduce the reserve fund, which had accumu-
lated to \$92,213. An attempt to reduce it had failed in previous years because the
fund-raising for the second edition of the Atlantic Cultural Space conference had
been extremely successful. This year, fewer expenses than expected were incurred.
The NBAB awarded grants totalling \$828,683 in its regular programs. The sum
of \$14,338 of unclaimed grant monies and withdrawals was recovered by closing
files on projects from the 2003-2004 year in accordance with the board's three-
year limit.

	2003 fiscal year and made public all grants and its investment strategy. A new accounting firm, Grant Thornton, was hired to audit the books of the NBAB and to advise the NBAB on the latest General Accounting Practices.
PROGRAMS	Funds for the Arts Board programs are awarded through juries of professional art- ists. During the year, a total of 30 jurors took part in three juries, one at the board offices and one by teleconference. For the sake of efficiency, it was decided that one panel of adjudicators would jury more than one program at a time. The board thanks these individuals for their dedication to the peer-review system. The Programs and Juries Committee continued to streamline the funding programs and to oversee the jury process. A continuing concern is the distribu- tion of funding among the province's regions, as well as between the rural and the urban communities. The NBAB's Executive Director has worked closely with two regions, Edmundston and Saint John to develop a pilot funding project that was launched in September 2007. The NBAB has recently signed a new agreement with Le Conseil des arts et des letters du Québec (CALQ) to create a new program for creative residencies. This program funds artists from NB to do creative residencies in Québec and Québec artists to do residencies in NB. Each institution funds artists from their respective province. Three grants per province were to be given out in FY 2007-2008.
CIRCLE OF ELDERS	On November 12, 2006, a Circle of Elders meeting was held at the New Brunswick Arts Board in accordance with a suggestion that two part-time aboriginal officers be hired to promote the NBAB programs to aboriginal artists from both aborig- inal communities (Maliseet and Mi'kmaq). The NBAB board adopted the idea and a pilot project and will implement it over two years: FY 2008-2009 and FY 2009- 2010. It is hoped that this pilot project will help ensure that aboriginal people are well represented and reflected in NBAB programs and in the system itself.
NB/PQ AGREEMENT	The NB/PQ agreement was signed in November of 2006. The guidelines and forms were developed in 2007, with the programme launch. Three professional artists from the province of New Brunswick and six professional artists from the province of Québec were selected by a jury of peers, organized in Montréal by the CALQ. A representative from the NBAB was present during the selection process. All applicants from New Brunswick were selected. The CALQ invested \$27,000 in this project and the NBAB invested \$13,000 in FY 2007-2008. This pilot project will continue for two more fiscal years under the present agreement. The NBAB is presently negotiating a similar partnership with the Manitoba Arts Council and is also negotiating a special agreement with the Arts Council of Northern Ireland in fine craft. Both programmes will be implemented in FY 2009-2010.

The NBAB sincerely thanks the CALQ for their continued collaboration.

REGIONAL PROJECT

In FY 2007-2008, the NBAB implemented its pilot Regional Project in Edmundston as well as in Saint John. The total cost for this project in both regions comes to \$187,500 per fiscal year. The partners, aside from the NBAB, include The Arts Development Branch of the Department of Wellness, Culture and Sport, Enterprise Saint John, Enterprise Madawaska, the City of Saint John, the City of Edmundston, and the professional artists in each region, who must contribute 25% of the total sum of their project. The reaction from the artists and the communities to this pilot project has been fantastic.

The projects were selected by a jury of peers organized by the NBAB. The criteria used by the jurors included: the artistic merit of the project; the place the project occupies in the artists' professional development; the artist's ability to complete the proposed project; and the community value of the project. Once the specialized jury made their recommendations, the results were presented to a regional committee for their approval.

Two press conferences were organized in each community, one to present the project and the other to announce the results. The press conferences were well attended in both communities.

The NBAB wishes to thank all the partners, who have demonstrated an exceptional degree of enthusiasm for this project. We hope for their continued support.

The NBAB is presently working to expand this project to other communities, such as Fredericton, Caraquet, and Moncton. Each community already has a cultural policy in place, a criteria that is contingent to the involvement of both the Arts Board and the Arts Branch.

OTHER RESOURCES

After extensively researching our FY 2006-2007 files, we pursued research in the area of Arts in Education in FY 2007-2008. The results were presented to our board members for a final decision about our implication in this area. It was decided that responsibility for arts in education lies more with the Arts Branch than with the Arts Board. The Arts Board can accommodate professional artists by offering them professional development grants if they wish to offer art courses in the school system.

The Council has also partnered with the Canada Council, the Arts Branch, and Heritage Canada, investing \$20,000 for a special research project on the public value of the arts in the province of New Brunswick. No such research had ever been done in this province before. The final results are expected to be released in November 2008. The following quantities have been invested: \$160,000 by the Canada Council, \$25,000 by the Arts Branch, and an estimated \$15,000 from Heritage Canada. The New Brunswick Arts Board invested in this project with the expectation that the results will affect our decision-making on the types of programs we offer professional artists.

EXCELLENCE AWARDS

During the 2008 Excellence Awards Gala and Ceremonies, NBAB presented four Excellence Awards in the Arts. This year, community development, literature, music, and visual arts particularly impressed the jury members. Roger Lord from Moncton received the André Thaddée-Bourque and Louise Manning Award for Excellence in Music. The Excellence in Community Cultural Development went to Paulette Thériault from Moncton. Saint John visual artist Alexandra Flood received the Miller Brittain Award for Excellence in Visual Art, and Anne Compton of Rothesay received the Alden Nowlan Award for Excellence in English-language Literary Arts.

In addition to these awards, the Emerging Artist of the Year Prize went to Jack Bishop of Saint John, who received the 2008 Prize for his excellent work in the visual arts.

The NBAB, in partnership with the Arts Development branch of the Department of Wellness, Culture and Sport, awarded two prizes of \$3,000 for the School of the Arts program. Every year, this program recognizes two schools — one Francophone and one Anglophone — whose innovative efforts to encourage the development of arts in their communities is outstanding. Carleton North High School and le Centre d'apprentissage du Haut Madawaska have both been recognized for extraordinary programs in the arts and community service.

The NBAB wishes to thank the Arts Branch for their continued contribution to organizing the Excellence Awards. This year, at the Lieutenant-Governor's invitation, the prize ceremonies once again took place at Old Government House.

The Lieutenant-Governor, Herménégilde Chiasson, presided over the gala evening and the presentation ceremonies. The NBAB is grateful to His Honour for the support he has given to the arts — in particular for making these ceremonies especially meaningful for the recipients. The next day, the recipients were acknowledged by the Legislative Assembly.

As is customary for NBAB, events were organized in the region of each recipient to honour them with their colleagues, friends, and neighbours during the weeks that followed the ceremonies.

COMMUNICATIONS The Board's strategic plan identifies communications as a key area for development. In addition to the regular issuance of press releases and website updates, the Board held public information sessions. On the government front, individual members of the Legislative Assembly were advised by letter of grants awarded to artists and arts organizations in their ridings after each competition. The NBAB has set up a new board communications committee headed by board member and retired journalist, Benoît Duguay. **OPERATIONS**

The staff of the Arts Board performed wonderfully in 2007-2008. Their efforts produced the annual report, the Excellence awards catalogue, and presentations of the Lieutenant-Governor's Award to winners in nine English and French schools around the province. The staff have been quite active in their everyday activities and have provided constant support to the Executive Director and the Board. Their effort and devotion are truly appreciated.

Juror nominations are screened by the Programs and Juries Committee and approved by the Arts Board. A new slate of jurors is drawn from a master list for each competition. Jurors are called upon according to a matrix of needs including region, culture, and artistic discipline. Jurors are entitled to serve on a jury once every three years. The jurors collaborate on a multidisciplinary basis, bringing particular strength in their areas of specialization.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

March 31, 2008

1. Nature of Operations

The New Brunswick Arts Board was a branch of the New Brunswick government until January 2000. At this time, the Board became an arm's length agency. The purpose of the Board is to provide grants and scholarships to qualifying individuals and organizations to enable them to perform various art functions. It is exempt from federal and provincial corporate taxes under paragraph 149(1) (1) of the Income Tax Act.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

Investments

All investments holdings were designated by the Board as held-for-trading on April 1, 2007 in accordance with new Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) handbook section 3855, and are recorded at fair value. Interest income is included in interest earned and is recognized in the period earned.

Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Revenue and expenditures

Revenue and expenditures are recorded using the accrual basis of accounting.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided as follows:

Computer equipment	33% straight line per year
Computer software	33% straight line per year
Office equipment	20% straight line per year

Use of estimates

Under Canadian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles management is required to make estimates and assumptions to prepare financial statements. These estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and actions that the Board may undertake in the future. These estimates and assumptions may affect the amount of assets and liabilities presented as at the reporting date and the reported amount of revenue and expenses during the fiscal period. Actual results may be different from the estimates and assumptions used.

Cash and cash equivalents

Included in cash and cash equivalents is cash on hand, balances with banks and short-term investments with maturities of less than 90 days.

4. Commitments

a) The Arts Board has leased office facilities with a minimum annual rent of \$32,136 excluding HST.

b) The Arts Board has a rented photocopier with a minimum annual rental of \$2,899 excluding HST.

5. Financial instruments

The Board's financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, investments and receivables or payables. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Board is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risk arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

6. Funds held in trust

Amounts held in trust for the New Brunswick Foundation for the Arts. The amount has been invested in a three year GIC maturing July 20, 2009. The amount will be forwarded to the Foundation on maturity subject to terms of an agreement between the two entities. If the terms are not met, the amount will revert to the Arts Board. This amount has been provided for by the Restricted Investments in the long term asset section of the balance sheet.

The Board derives a significant portion of its revenue under funding arrangements with the Province of New Brunswick.

11. Change in Accounting Policy

Investments

Effective April 1, 2007, the Board adopted new CICA handbook section 3855, Financial Instruments – Recognition and Measurement, and as a result the Board changed its method of accounting for its investment holdings. In accordance with the transitional provisions of the new handbook section, this change is being applied prospectively with no restatement of prior periods.

Under the previous policy, investment holdings were carried at cost. Interest income was recognized in the period earned. Under the new policy, all investment holdings are classified as held-for-trading and are carried at fair value. Interest income is included in interest earned and is recognized in the period earned.

Accordingly, on April 1, 2007, the Board re-measured its investment holdings and recorded them at fair value. The opening carrying value of investments were not significantly different from fair value, therefore no opening restatement was required.

As a result of this change, investments are valued at fair value as at March 31, 2008 with comparative amount valued at cost as at March 31, 2007.

Mrs. Scott presently lives in Saint John, NB where she is the founder and director of Port City Dance Academy and Felicità, its student performing ensemble. Under her artistic direction, both are extremely vibrant organizations which have earned a reputation for excellence with students going to study professionally at The National Ballet School, The Royal Winnipeg Ballet School, Ecole Supérieure de Danse du Québec, the schools of Alberta Ballet and Ballet Jörgen, and Quinte, as well as going on to pursue studies in dance at York University, Ryerson University, and the University of Calgary. Voted as one of Here Magazine's top ten most interesting people, Mrs. Scott is honoured to be a member of the Saint John Community Arts Board and the New Brunswick Arts Board. In 2005, Mrs. Scott received The New Brunswick Day Merit Award for Arts and Culture, and has been nominated for the NBAB's Award for Excellence in Dance.

Mrs. Simon-Crossman did some professional arts training through Thompson College in Montreal and the foundation visual arts program at the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design in Fredericton. An active participant in First Nations activities, Mrs. Simon-Crossman has participated in the APTN/Eastern Tides TV program, the Aboriginal Day Festival fashion show and craft display in Fredericton, the Eel Ground Pow Wow as well as the Red Bank Pow Wow whose focus was on First Nation apparel or regalia. She has also taken community based training on bead work and leather crafts, has organized and participated in quilting classes as well as being a teacher. She is presently teaching Native arts and crafts in her own community with children from ages 5 to 14.

DAVID UMHOLTZ David Umholtz lives in Deer Island, NB, and is a graduate of University of Pennsylvania School of Fine Arts with a major in printmaking and painting. He has worked as a silkscreen and etching printer, photographer and journalist, and he has taught at the Emily Carr School of Art and the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design. He has given workshops at numerous universities across Canada. Since 1969, he has prepared 26 solo exhibitions and participated in over 40 group exhibitions presenting in Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom.
