## **MANDATE**

#### Our mandate, as defined in the New Brunswick Arts Board Act, is as follows:

#### The New Brunswick Arts Board has the following purposes:

- To facilitate and promote the creation and production of art.
- To facilitate and promote the enjoyment, awareness and understanding of the arts.
- To provide advice to the government, through the Minister, on policy development respecting the arts and on matters relating to the arts.
- To promote and advocate for arts excellence.
- To celebrate artistic excellence through the development and administration of awards programs to recognize high achievement in the arts.

- To develop and administer programs on behalf of the Minister to provide financial support to individuals and arts organizations for artistic creation and professional development opportunities.
- To establish and operate a system of peer assessment, a jury system or other methods of evaluation:
- Related to the artistic merits of works, projects and proposals submitted to the Board or to the Minister, and:
- The selection of new acquisitions, including acquisitions for the New Brunswick Art Bank;
- To carry out such other activities or duties in relation to the arts as the Minister may direct or approve.

## **EQUITY STATEMENT**

The New Brunswick Arts Board strives to co-create an equitable, diverse, and inclusive world in which all people have fair access to the tools and resources they need to bring to light their creative vision. We are committed to working with equity-seeking communities to remove systemic barriers based on race, gender, sexuality, disability, belief, age, geography, and language. artsnb acknowledges that this is a living statement, and we expect it to evolve as the world changes and our consciousness matures.

## TERRITORY ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

As a provincial entity, the New Brunswick Arts Board acknowledges that it carries out its work on the traditional unceded territory of the Wolastoqiyik, Mi'kmaq, and Peskotomuhkati peoples. This territory is covered by the "Treaties of Peace and Friendship" which these nations first signed with the British Crown in 1726. The treaties did not deal with the surrender of lands and resources, but in fact recognized Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqiyik title and established the rules for what was to be an ongoing relationship between nations.

We, the staff and members of the board, pay respect to the elders, past and present, and descendants of this land. We honour the knowledge keepers and seek their guidance as we strive to develop closer relationships with the Indigenous people in New Brunswick.

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# MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

It has been a pleasure this year working with new artsnb ED Jean-Pierre Caissie, alongside the ever talented and dedicated artsnb team, as I complete my second term on the artsnb Board of Directors. A year to be bookmarked by the official end of the global emergency status more than three years after its original declaration, it was one of productive - and continuing - relaunch efforts to rebuild the greatly impacted arts and culture sector in New Brunswick.

Among many highlights, the work of the Status of the Artist Transition Committee has been a focus of this year. Comprised of representatives from the Association acadienne des artistes professionnel.le.s du Nouveau-Brunswick (AAAPNB), ArtsLink NB, Mawi'Art: Wabanaki Artist Collective, and artsnb, with representatives from the Departments of Tourism, Heritage and Culture (TCH), Education and Early Childhood Development (EECE), Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour (PETL), and other government agencies, the committee is working to identify measures, requirements and potential forms of collaboration to implement recommendations from the Report of the Premier's Task Force on the Status of the Artist towards the improvement of the socio-economic conditions of professional artists in New Brunswick and throughout Canada more broadly.

Committee topics at hand have included, for instance, the need to identify obstacles to access to childcare services and scoping requirements for research on the nature and quantity of invisible labour in the arts; the significant and recurring amount of preparation, research, and development that is essential for an artistic career, yet unrecognized and unpaid, and so not taken into account when calculating social protection benefits. This improved understanding is essential towards the development of recommendations to consider invisible labour in social programs.

On behalf of the board I would like to once again thank the Honourable Tammy Scott-Wallace, Minister of Tourism, Heritage and Culture, Deputy Minister Yennah Hurley, and Assistant Deputy Minister Jocelyne Mills, for their commitment to the development of New Brunswick Status of the Artist legislation that not only recognizes and affirms the vital contribution of artists to the cultural, social, economic, and educational fabric of New Brunswick and acknowledges creative work as a public good, but also ensures professional artists receive fair compensation for the creation, performance, and use of their creative work and underscores the government's commitment to improving the socio-economic status of artists.

I am grateful to have had the opportunity to serve the New Brunswick arts community in this small way over the past six years through my time on the artsnb board. I look forward to watching the continuation of our efforts as a community member, with an ever prosperous and diverse arts sector contributing to a rich and vibrant New Brunswick.



## Key actions for 2022-2023

#### **GOAL 1**

#### Keystone Principles: Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Accessibility (IDEA)

We subscribe to the principles of Inclusivity, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility (IDEA) in everything we do. They are the foundation of all our other strategic goals.

#### **GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 2022-2023**

**Increase the diversity of staff, board and juries** so that our structures reflect the diversity of New Brunswick's arts community.

**BOARD:** Communicate to the New Brunswick government, through the Minister, the need for greater diversity on the Board of Directors and present a rationale for our recommendations.

#### **RESULTS:**

In addition to reappointing Vanessa Moeller and Darren McLeod, **the Minister of Tourism, Heritage and Culture has also appointed César Suárez to the Board.** César Suárez is a Venezuelan-born Canadian classical musician who has been living in Saint John since 2017, where he works as conductor of Sistema New Brunswick and the Saint John Youth Orchestra.

**TEAM AND JURY: Prioritize diversity when hiring or selecting jurors,** balancing representation needs based on language, region, gender or sexual orientation, artistic discipline, cultural background, disability, and immigration status.

#### **RESULTS:**

Juries are always made up of **professional artists**, balancing region, artistic discipline, gender, and language. **This year, artsnb has prioritized representation of artists from equity-seeking communities** when assembling juries, with increased participation from BIPOC artists on juries.

**Develop an outreach plan for marginalized communities,** aimed at: seeking advice, engaging with individuals and organizations, participating at the community level to improve our understanding of issues and challenges.

#### RESULTS:

An outreach plan has been developed by artsnb Communications Officer Audrée Hamelin-St-Amour to specify the actions to be taken to reach out to communities. Program Officers Tilly Jackson and Rebecca Salazar have developed a protocol for applicants who request feedback from the jury. This protocol proposes that a summary of the jury's comments be communicated, as well as some contextual information such as the total number of applications and information about the peer jury process, etc.

Increase the proportion of grants awarded to people from marginalized and racialized communities, including Indigenous artists, Black artists, and artists of colour, 2SLGBTQIA+ artists, D/ deaf artists and artists with disabilities, as well as newcomers to New Brunswick.

#### **RESULTS:**

With the anonymous data collected through the Voluntary Self-Identification (VSID) form, **artsnb** will be able to better assess the allocation of funds within its funding programs.



#### **GOAL 2**

#### **Engagement, Outreach, and Partnerships**

artsnb will reach out and engage with its wide and diverse range of partners and stakeholders, so that they are more aware of what funding and resources we offer; in turn, we will have a better understanding of the needs of the community.

#### **GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 2022-2023**

Continue to play a major role in implementing the recommendations of the Report on the Status of the Artist and in recovery efforts following the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### **RESULTS:**

artsnb is a keen participant in the Transition Committee on the Status of the Artist and outlines the organization's data and needs to implement the recommendations developed in the Report of the Premier's Task Force on the Status of the Artist.





**Implement an awareness campaign** to clarify artsnb's role to stakeholders, so that they understand how artsnb fits into the arts ecosystem in New Brunswick, by raising artsnb's profile throughout the province to raise awareness of the resources artsnb offers professional artists to increase their capacity to create, disseminate and promote their work, and to become more self-sufficient.

#### **RESULTS:**

artsnb, through Communications Officer Audrée Hamelin-St-Amour, has developed an outreach plan that includes both online and in-person activities. Online activities include:

- > Monthly newsletter
- > Sustained social media presence (Instagram, Twitter, Facebook and LinkedIn)
- > Speed-Consulting sessions
- > Lunch and Learn sessions with community stakeholders
- > artsnb blog, featuring grant recipients

## Ty Giffin, media arts Creation Program

**Be physically present on the ground,** interacting with customers and stakeholders; offer workshops and participate in forums to raise awareness of our programs and resources, and learn more about arts in communities.

#### **RESULTS:**

With the mitigation of the COVID-19 pandemic and government constraints on public health, artsnb has returned to being more present in the community. Board members attend events and gatherings when possible. In addition to its online outreach activities, the artsnb team has also hit the road again for community meetings and continues to deliver online sessions. A total of 22 information sessions were delivered in 2022-2023, including 6 Lunch and Learn sessions and 13 Speed-Consulting sessions.

**Work with equity-minded partners** who can advise us, help us connect with marginalized groups, and adapt our processes and programs to better support them.

#### **RESULTS:**

Meetings were held with the Black Artists Alliance of New Brunswick and the Association Initiatives Afro-Canadiennes du Nouveau-Brunswick to discuss how best to reach these multidisciplinary communities. A tour of three French-speaking communities was carried out in the north of the province, as well as visits to nine First Nations communities.

"Cicerone the largest project I had ever produced. While it did put a lot of pressure on me, it also freed me up creatively in many respects, and allowed us to pay our crew and collaborators. ## Excerpt from the artsnb blog: The land as kin, one stitch at a time

"Over the summer months, I've had the joy of working on a beaded wetland landscape inspired by photos I took while at the peat bog in Kouchibouguac National Park. This landscape is a project that has lived in my head for years, but I lacked the funding to buy the materials and the time needed to bring it to life. With the support of the artsnb Equinox grant, I was able to create this piece, and I have learned a great deal through the process."

In collaboration with the Circle of Elders, **explore the possibility of developing a new Lieutenant Governor's Award** for High Achievement in the Arts for Indigenous artists.

#### **RESULTS:**

The Board of Directors passed a resolution at its October 2022 meeting to **recommend the creation of an Indigenous Artist Award.** The call for nominations for this new award was launched on January 1, 2023. .



**Seek learning opportunities** to increase our understanding of the needs and challenges faced by equity stakeholders and develop ways to adapt and meet them.

#### RESULTS:

Team members have taken training and attended professional development opportunities over the past year, on topics such as decolonization of arts organizations, privacy, copyright, archiving, aboriginal protocols for arts organizations, Microsoft Excel software, anti-oppression approaches, and more..

#### **GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 2022-2023**

**Deploy the Voluntary Self-Identification (VSID) tool** that will help us better gather demographic information, understand how artsnb grants are awarded, as well as enable us to better inform our stakeholders.

#### RESULTS:

**The Voluntary Self-Identification (VSID) form was integrated** into artsnb's online application system in summer 2022. A press release announced this new feature in August 2022.

**Develop and implement a multi-year research plan;** share perspectives and take stock of efforts to address funding and resource gaps.

#### **RESULTS:**

An initial multi-year research plan was presented by Program Officer Rebecca Salazar to the Board of Directors to direct efforts to collect and analyze the data produced, and to target certain topics for external research.

Serve on national research committees and share data on the arts in New Brunswick with partners around the world.

#### **RESULTS:**

Over the past year, **artsnb has become a member of the National Research Group** and has signed a confidentiality and data-sharing agreement with the New Brunswick Department of Tourism, Heritage and Culture.

Hire an intern to help Program Officers with the research and analysis required to gather data.

#### **RESULTS:**

**artsnb hired intern Anna Wyllie,** who narrowed down the list of potential juries and collected data and trends on gender, sexual orientation, first language, artistic disciplines, etc. of previous jury members.

#### **GOAL 4**

#### **Funding, Resources, and Access**

artsnb will continue to work with its partners and government to ensure that it has the financial, technological, and human resources to support the broad arts ecosystem of New Brunswick so that it can thrive.

#### **GOALS AND OBJECTIVES 2022-2023**

Based on database analysis and consultations, **draft a budget for more grant funding** in 2023-2024, to help artists through the upheaval of the pandemic.

#### **RESULTS:**

A budget letter was drafted and sent to the Minister of Tourism, Heritage and Culture, requesting additional investments in artsnb's programs, taking into account program revisions, rising inflation, and so on. In addition, artsnb communicated its funding needs to the Minister of Finance and Treasury Board at a pre-budget meeting and by sending a brief.

**Explore funding opportunities** through a digital strategy initiative to develop digital tools that will help streamline our own work and lighten staff workloads.

#### **RESULTS:**

The Board of Directors and the team have been examining the issue of digital transformation and the need to improve our work. Some improvements have already been made.

**Streamline the application process for all our programs** to improve clarity and accessibility of information, eliminating inconsistencies from program to program, and update our website to increase accessibility for equity-seeking groups.

#### **RESULTS:**

A program revision plan has been developed in three phases covering 2022-2023, 2023-2024, and 2024-2025. A first phase of standardization and simplification of the guidelines was carried out during the last year. The French text was updated using gender-neutral language. In addition, the eligibility of immigrants was reviewed and an announcement to this effect will be made in 2023-2024.



## Dariush Zarbafian, music Documentation Program

**Update governance policies** and request training for the Board of Directors to help them better understand and fulfill their role.

#### **RESULTS:**

The Board of Directors attended a series of governance training sessions offered by the Chapman Group in the fall of 2022. The consulting firm also reviewed the by-laws and made recommendations to improve or create the necessary tools for Board members.

Management and program officers consult with the sector and other provincial funders, including THC, Music NB, NB Film Coop, etc., to understand where funding gaps exist, identify affected stakeholders, and find collaborative solutions to fill these gaps.

#### **RESULTS:**

artsnb maintained communications with its Atlantic arts funders partners, as well as participated in discussions within the Canadian Public Arts Funders (CPAF) of which artsnb is a member; Jean-Pierre Caissie has participated to the annual meetings.

Moreover, a meeting was held between artsnb, Music NB, and the Department of Tourism Heritage and Culture's Arts Section to begin discussing arts funding in the province.

#### Excerpt from the artsnb blog: Acadian music under the lens of an ethnomusicologist

"The objective of this project is to produce a theoretical work by studying Acadian music from an ethnomusicological point of view, that is to say, by analyzing the structures of the musical pieces, extracting their characteristics (which makes it possible to identify their originality), and the period in which the Acadians produced their own compositions."

Convert the Indigenous Outreach Officer position to a permanent one.

#### RESULTS:

The position of Indigenous Outreach Officer, held by Corrina Merasty (Wapisiw Tiphithimis Iskwew), has been converted to a permanent position, thanks to the support of the New Brunswick Department of Tourism, Heritage and Culture.

**Collaborate with partners in efforts** to help New Brunswick artists recover from the economic downturn of the COVID pandemic.

#### **RESULTS:**

Additional funding from the Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour has been allocated to the Professional Development component of the Career Development program.













#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of New Brunswick Arts Board

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of New Brunswick Arts Board (the Organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2023, and the statements of changes in net assets, operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at March 31, 2023, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Organization in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with those requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Organization's financial reporting process.

Independent Auditor's Report to the Members of New Brunswick Arts Board (continued)

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements. As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

#### NATURE OF OPERATIONS

The New Brunswick Arts Board is an arm's length arts non-profit funding agency with a legislated mandate to facilitate and promote the creation of art and administer funding to qualifying individuals and organizations. It is exempt from corporate taxes under paragraph 149(1)(f) as a registered charity under the Income Tax Act.

#### 2. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The organization derives a significant portion of its revenue under funding arrangements with the Province of New Brunswick.

#### 3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNFPO).

#### Cash and cash equivalents

The organization considers cash on hand, short-term deposits and balances with banks, net of overdrafts as cash or cash equivalents. Bank borrowings are considered to be financing activities.

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

#### Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Endowment contributions are recognized as direct increases in net assets.

#### 3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Financial instruments policy

The organization considers any contracts a financial asset, liability, or equity instrument as a financial instrument, except in certain limited circumstances. The organization accounts for the following as financial instruments:

- 1. Cash and temporary investments
- 2. Accounts receivable
- 3. Payables and accruals

A financial asset or liability is recognized when the organization becomes party to contractual provisions of the instrument.

The organization initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions.

Financial assets or liabilities obtained in related party transactions are measured in accordance with the accounting policy for related party transactions except for those transactions that are with a person or entity whose sole relationship with the organization is in the capacity of management in which case they are accounted for in accordance with financial instruments.

The organization subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at cost or amortized cost less any reduction for impairment, except for temporary investments which are measured at fair value.

The organization removes financial liabilities, or a portion of, when the obligation is discharged, cancelled, or expires.

#### 4. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization is not exposed to any significant risks through its financial instruments as of March 31, 2023. The organization has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage potential risks.

# 5. TEMPORARY INVESTMENTS

Excess cash is held in short term money market mutual funds bearing interest at 4.05% (2022 - 0.6%).

2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-Chair



**CÉSAR SUÁREZ**(as of November 2022)






# **STAFF**
