

Summary of the Peer Jury Feedback

Equinox Program for Indigenous Artists September 15, 2025 Deadline

General information and data

- 20 applications were evaluated by a multidisciplinary peer jury of Indigenous artists.
- The jury was able to award 11 grants with the available budget envelope for this competition (55.0 % success rate).
- 4 additional applications received a status of "Merit." This status indicates that the jury wished to recommend these applications for funding, but that the program budget was insufficient to fund all meriting applications.
- The jury assigned 5 applications the status of "Not Recommended". This result does not necessarily mean that the work lacks merit; grant assessment is a competitive process and budgets are limited. Remember that every program deadline has a different set of applicants and a different jury. Of the 11 grants awarded, 3 were awarded to applicants who are receiving their first grant from artsnb.

Recommendations on application components

- The jury was excited to see a range of projects transmitting traditional artforms
 to the community, for example through teaching and workshops. The jury
 encouraged artists proposing these projects to specify what makes your
 workshop unique, or what perspective your specific artistic experience brings to
 the workshop participants.
- For artists in craft and visual arts, and especially for emerging artists in these
 disciplines, the jury recommended obtaining professional quality photographs of
 your artworks for samples of work. Artists can apply to artsnb's <u>Career</u>
 <u>Development—Professionalization & Promotion</u> grant to obtain funding to hire a
 professional photographer for this purpose.
- For artists who are more established and whose work includes a lot of collaboration, the jurors wished to see more letters of recommendation and optional supporting materials to show the impact their work has on their communities and artistic disciplines.
- The jury encouraged all applicants to keep applying and improving their grant
 writing skills. Most of the time, when an application does not receive a grant, it is
 because the jury felt it did not include enough detail about the artist's vision,
 their proposed project, or their work plan to accomplish the project. The jury



- recognized the value of all the projects proposed and encourages applicants to keep seeking support for their work.
- The jury encouraged applicants to reach out to artsnb's Indigenous Outreach Liaison, Emilio Q. Bonnell (emilio@artsnb.ca), for advice and support while preparing applications.
